Antarctica	14.2 million km ²			
Europe	10.2 million km ²			
Australia (Oceania)	8.6 million km ²			

Warning!

Don't confuse the continent of Australia with the country of Australia! The continent contains Australia, New Zealand, Tasmania, New Guinea and the Polynesian and Micronesian islands.

Did you know?

- The surface of Earth is only about 30% land.
- The equator passes through the continents of South America, Africa and Asia.
- Asia has 1/3 of all land on Earth. It also has the highest population, followed by Africa.
- Australia (Oceania) and Antarctica are 'island' continents, separated from other continents by water.
- Europe is the only continent without any deserts.
- Russia, the world's largest country, is in both Europe and Asia.
- The smallest country, the Vatican City, is in Europe.
- North America has every type of climate from polar to tropical.
- The highest mountains, the Himalayas, are in Asia.
- The largest rainforest, the Amazon, is in South America.

Antarctica contains no countries. It is also the coldest continent, and has the smallest population.
