Enquiry Question: Which significant individuals fought for the rights we have today?		
Questions <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Who was Emily Davison and what is she most famous for? What was Emily Davison fighting for and why? Who was Rosa Parks and what is she most famous for? What was Rosa Parks fighting for and why? How have children's rights changed? Is Marcus Rashford a significant individual? Why? Why not? What changes occurred because of these events / significant individuals? (Timeline) 		
Key knowledge <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Over 100 years ago, different groups of people did not have equal rights (e.g. genders, races, etc) Emmeline Pankhurst founded the Woman's Social and Political Union and Emily Davison joined No matter how often Emily Davison and her fellow suffragettes campaigned for their rights, nothing changed. Emily was determined to make change happen, no matter the cost Emily Davison was ran out in front of a horse and was fatally injured After Emily's death, all women prisoners who were on hunger strike were released Rosa Parks wanted to help fight racism and fight for equality Buses were segregated into an area for white people and area for black people. Black people had to move out of their seats if the white area became too full. In 1955 Rosa Parks refused to give up her seat on a bus and was arrested Lots of people supported Rosa Parks and refused the use the bus services – this was a turning point in the fight against racism After 381 days of protest, segregation on the buses was lifted Marcus Rashford is a famous football player but is also known for his work fighting for children's rights Marcus' family didn't always have much money when they were growing up and had to rely on food banks or free school meals. Marcus Rashford has fought for children to have access to free school meals, particularly during the COVID 19 pandemic 	Chronology

	1909	Suffragettes are imprisoned and go on hunger strike
	1913	Rosa Parks was born in Alabama, USA
	1913	Emily Davison attended the Epsom Derby where she ran out in front of a horse and was fatally injured The following year all women prisoners
	1914	World War I began and many women entered the workplace as there is a shortage of male workers
	1928	All women in Britain gain equal voting rights with men
	1955	Rosa refused to give up her seat on the bus and was arrested
	1955	The bus boycott took place
	1956	The supreme court changed the laws
	1996	Rosa was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom
	2005	Rosa died at the age of 92
	2016	Marcus Rashford joined the England Team
	2020	Marcus Rashford worked with a charity to give meals to children while they were at home during the COVID pandemic October 2020 – Marcus was given a special award, an MBE He started a petition to ask for more money to be given to feed children, especially during the school holidays
