Step 4 – Protective measures

The country's move to Step 4 of the roadmap marked a new phase in the government's response to the pandemic, moving away from stringent restrictions on everyone's day-to-day lives, towards advising people on how to protect themselves and others, alongside targeted interventions to reduce risk. Many protective measures that have been in place in schools are now no longer required in normal circumstances. This risk assessment reflects these changes, setting out the protective measures which will remain in place.

Step 4 – Future outbreak planning

This Risk Assessment is to be read alongside the school's Outbreak Management Plan, which describes what the school would do if children, pupils, students or staff test positive for COVID-19, or how the school would operate if it was advised to reintroduce any measures described in this document to help break chains of transmission. It is essential for the Outbreak Management Plan to be kept up-to-date and relevant to the school's unique setting, referencing the government's [COVID-19 Contingency Framework](#) and the [Surrey County Council local outbreak control plan](#).



This risk assessment sets out the additional protective measures which will be considered in the case of and for the duration of an outbreak i.e. if a specific threshold is met, as set out in the government’s [COVID-19 Contingency Framework](#) and the school’s Outbreak Management Plan. The additional measures are given in this risk assessment under separate headings “***Temporary additional measures in the event of an outbreak***” and are shown in *italic* text.

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<p>Prevention</p> <p>Minimise contact with individuals who are unwell with COVID-19 symptoms</p>	<p>When an individual develops COVID-19 symptoms or has a positive test</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • If a pupil or staff member develops COVID-19 symptoms or has a positive test they will follow public health advice on when to self-isolate and what to do. They should not come into school if they have symptoms, have had a positive test result or other reasons requiring them to stay at home due to the risk of them passing on COVID-19 (for example, they are required to quarantine). • If anyone in the school develops COVID-19 symptoms, however mild, they will be sent home and they should follow public health advice. • For everyone with symptoms, they should avoid using public transport and, wherever possible, be collected by a member of their family or household. • If a pupil is awaiting collection, they should be moved to a separate room if possible and safe to do so. (S&L room /Hall/Main entrance whichever is available. Windows and doors should be opened for fresh air ventilation if possible. Appropriate PPE should also be used if close contact is necessary (such as for a very young child or a child with complex needs). • Whilst a staff member of the child’s class isolates the child, a member of the office team will contact the parents and ask them to come and collect the child immediately • All parents are reminded to update their mobile numbers as soon as they change and that phones must be kept on during the day • Further information on this can be found in the use of PPE in education, childcare and children’s social care settings guidance. Anyone with coronavirus (COVID-19) symptoms should not visit the GP, pharmacy, urgent care centre or a hospital.• Any members of staff who have helped someone with symptoms and any pupils who have been in close contact with them do not need to go home to self-isolate unless they develop symptoms themselves (in which case, they should arrange a test) or they have been requested to do so by NHS Test & Trace.• Everyone will wash their hands thoroughly for 20 seconds with soap and running water or use hand sanitiser after any contact with someone who is unwell. Where recommended use of face covering</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> From Step 4, face coverings are no longer recommended for pupils, staff and visitors either in classrooms or in communal areas. Pupils aged 11 and over should wear a face covering when travelling on dedicated transport to secondary school or college. <p><i>Temporary additional measures in the event of an outbreak</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <i>If a specific threshold in the school's Outbreak Management Plan is met the following additional measures will be considered.</i> <i>Face coverings will temporarily be re-introduced in communal areas and classrooms for staff and visitors, unless exempt.</i> <i>Face visors or shields can be worn by those exempt from wearing a face covering but they are not an equivalent alternative in terms of source control of virus transmission. They should only be used after carrying out a risk assessment for the specific situation and should always be cleaned appropriately. <p>Prevention Cleaning and disinfection</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Surfaces that pupils are touching, such as toys, books, desks, chairs, doors, sinks, toilets, light switches, bannisters are cleaned more regularly than normal. • More frequent cleaning of rooms and shared areas that are used by different groups • Toilets will need to be cleaned regularly and pupils must be encouraged to clean their hands thoroughly after using the toilet - different groups being allocated their own toilet blocks could be considered but is not a requirement if the site does not allow for it • The <u>COVID-19: cleaning of non-healthcare settings guidance</u> is followed. • Outdoor playground equipment should be cleaned more frequently. This includes resources used inside and outside by wrap around care providers as set out in the School Lettings Policy/Contract. • Spillages of bodily fluids, e.g. respiratory and nasal discharges, are cleaned up immediately in line with the Infection Control Policy and <u>Cleaning in non-healthcare settings</u> guidance • Cleaners are employed by the school to carry out daily, thorough cleaning that follows national guidance and is compliant with the COSHH Policy and the Health and Safety Policy. • The SBM arranges enhanced cleaning to be undertaken where required – advice about enhanced cleaning protocols is sought from the local health team. 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<p>Prevention</p> <p>6. Minimise contact</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> From Step 4, it is no longer recommend that it is necessary to keep children in consistent groups ('bubbles'). Bubbles will not need to be used for any in the school from the autumn term. <p>Educational visits</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> School trips can take place and the school will undertake full and thorough risk assessments in relation to all educational visits and ensure that any public health advice, such as hygiene and ventilation requirements, is included as part of that risk assessment. General guidance about educational visits is available and is supported by specialist advice from the Outdoor Education Advisory Panel (OEAP). <p>After School activities</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> From Step 4, it is no longer recommended necessary to keep children in consistent groups ('bubbles'). This means that bubbles will not need to be from the autumn term. Wraparound childcare and other organised activities for children may take place in groups of any number. Temporary additional measures in the event of an outbreak

- *If a specific threshold in the school's Outbreak Management Plan is met the following additional measures will be considered.*
- *It may become necessary to reintroduce 'bubbles' for a temporary period, to reduce mixing between groups, as follows.*
- *The number of contacts between pupils and staff is reduced. This is achieved through keeping groups separate (in 'Bubbles'). The school will consider:*
 - *The layout of the school site;*
 - *The feasibility of keeping distinct groups separate while offering a broad curriculum*

- *All teachers and other staff can operate across different classes and year groups in order to facilitate the delivery of the school timetable. This will be particularly important for secondary schools.*
- *Supply teachers, peripatetic teachers and/or other temporary staff can move between schools.*
- *Large gatherings such as assemblies are avoided, and groups kept apart.*



	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • <i>The timetable is revised to implement where possible:</i> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ <i>Plan for lessons or activities which keep groups apart and movement around the school site to a minimum;</i> ○ <i>Maximise the number of lessons or classroom activities which could take place outdoors;</i> ○ <i>Staggered assembly groups;</i> ○ <i>Break times (including lunch) are staggered so that all pupils are not moving around the school at the same time.</i> • <i>Pupils use the same classroom or defined area of a setting throughout the day, with a thorough cleaning of the rooms at the end of the day, and are seated at the same desk.</i> • <i>Mixing within education or childcare setting is minimised by:</i> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ <i>accessing rooms directly from outside where possible;</i> ○ <i>considering one-way circulation, or place a divider down the middle of the corridor to keep groups apart as they move through the setting where spaces are accessed by corridors;</i> ○ <i>staggering lunch breaks and pupils clean their hands beforehand and enter in the groups they are already in or pupils are brought their lunch in their classrooms;</i> ○ <i>The number of pupils using the toilet at any one time is limited.</i> • <i>The use of shared space such as halls is limited and there is cleaning between use by different groups.</i> 					
<p>Prevention</p> <p>7. Keep occupied spaces well ventilated</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Good ventilation reduces the concentration of the virus in the air, which reduces the risk from airborne transmission. When the school is in operation, it is important to ensure it is well ventilated and a comfortable teaching environment is maintained. These can be achieved by a variety of measures including: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ mechanical ventilation systems – these should be adjusted to increase the ventilation rate wherever possible and checked to confirm that normal operation meets current guidance and that only fresh outside air is circulated. If possible, systems should be adjusted to full fresh air or, if not, then systems should be operated as normal as long as they are within a single room and supplemented by an outdoor air supply 	High	All in place	Sept 2021	1 st Sept 2021	Low



	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ natural ventilation – opening windows (in cooler weather windows should be opened just enough to provide constant background ventilation and opened more fully during breaks to purge the air in the space). Opening internal doors can also assist with creating a throughput of air ○ natural ventilation – if necessary external opening doors may also be used (as long as they are not fire doors and where safe to do so) The Health and Safety Executive guidance on air conditioning and ventilation during the coronavirus outbreak and CIBSE coronavirus (COVID-19) advice provides more information. ● To balance the need for increased ventilation while maintaining a comfortable temperature, consider: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ opening high level windows in colder weather in preference to low level to reduce draughts ○ increasing the ventilation while spaces are unoccupied (for example, between classes, during break and lunch, when a room is unused) ○ providing flexibility to allow additional, suitable indoor clothing ○ rearranging furniture where possible to avoid direct draughts ● Heating to be used as necessary to ensure comfort levels are maintained particularly in occupied spaces. ● CO2 monitors and guidance for their use will be provided to the school during the Autumn term. 					
<p>Prevention</p> <p>8 Where necessary, wear PPE</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● The majority of staff in education settings will not require PPE beyond what they would normally need for their work. <p>Prevention</p> <p>9. Promote and engage in asymptomatic testing, where available</p>	<p>Asymptomatic testing</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Testing remains important in reducing the risk of transmission of infection within schools. • Over holidays, staff will continue to test regularly if they are attending settings that remain open, such as summer schools and out of school activities based in school settings. The school will only provide tests for twice weekly asymptomatic testing staff over the summer period if they are attending school settings. • Staff undertake twice weekly home tests whenever they are on site until the end of September, when this will also be reviewed by the DFE • The school does not expect our children to test regularly however parents may choose to do this <p>Confirmatory PCR tests</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Staff and pupils with a positive LFD test result should self-isolate in line with the stay at home guidance for households with possible or confirmed coronavirus (COVID-19) infection. They will also need to get a free PCR test to check if they have COVID-19. • Whilst awaiting the PCR result, the individual should continue to self-isolate. • If the PCR test is taken within 2 days of the positive lateral flow test, and is negative, it overrides the self-test LFD test and the pupil can return to school, as long as the individual doesn't have COVID-19 symptoms. • Additional information on PCR test kits for schools and further education providers is available. 	<p>High</p>	<p>All in place</p>	<p>Sept 2021</p>	<p>1st Sept 2021</p>	<p>Low</p>
<p>Response to Infection</p> <p>10. Test and trace</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • From Step 4, close contacts will be identified via NHS Test and Trace and the school is no longer expected to undertake contact tracing. • As with positive cases in any other setting, NHS Test and Trace will work with the positive case and/or their parent to identify close contacts. Contacts from a school setting will only be traced by NHS Test and Trace where the positive case and/or their parent specifically identifies the individual as being a close contact. This is likely to be a small number of individuals who would be most at risk of contracting COVID-19 due to the nature of the close contact. • The school is aware it may be contacted in exceptional cases to help with identifying close contacts, as currently happens in managing other infectious diseases. 					



	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Individuals are not required to self-isolate if they live in the same household as someone with COVID-19, or are a close contact of someone with COVID-19, and any of the following apply: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ they are fully vaccinated ○ they are below the age of 18 years and 6 months ○ they have taken part in or are currently part of an approved COVID-19 vaccine trial ○ they are not able to get vaccinated for medical reasons • Instead, they will be contacted by NHS Test and Trace, informed they have been in close contact with a positive case and advised to take a PCR test. • The school will encourage all individuals to take a PCR test if advised to do so. • Staff who do not need to isolate, and children and young people aged under 18 years 6 months who usually attend school, and have been identified as a close contact, should continue to attend school as normal. They do not need to wear a face covering within the school, but it is expected and recommended that these are worn when travelling on public or dedicated transport. • 18-year-olds will be treated in the same way as children until 6 months after their 18th birthday, to allow them the opportunity to get fully vaccinated. At which point, they will be subject to the same rules as adults and so if they choose not to get vaccinated, they will need to self-isolate if identified as a close contact. 					
<p>Response to infection</p> <p>11. Contain any outbreaks</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The <u>contingency framework</u> describes the principles of managing local outbreaks of COVID-19 in education and childcare settings. Local authorities, directors of public health (DsPH) and PHE health protection teams (HPTs) can recommend measures described in the contingency framework in individual education and childcare settings – or a small cluster of settings – as part of their outbreak management responsibilities. The school’s Outbreak Management Plan describes what it would do if children, pupils, students or staff test positive for COVID-19, or how the school would operate if it was advised to reintroduce any measures described in this document to help break chains of transmission. The Outbreak Management Plan will be kept up-to-date and relevant to the school’s unique setting, referencing the government’s <u>COVID-19 Contingency Framework</u> and the <u>Surrey County Council local outbreak control plan</u>. Workforce	<p>Clinically extremely vulnerable (CEV)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Clinically extremely vulnerable (CEV) people are advised, as a minimum, to follow the same guidance as everyone else. It is important that everyone adheres to this guidance, but CEV people may wish to think particularly carefully about the additional precautions they can continue to take. Further information can be found in the 19 July guidance on protecting people who are CEV from COVID-19. The school is able to explain the measures it has in place to keep CEV staff safe at work, noting the Health and Safety Executive's (HSE) guidance on protecting vulnerable workers, including advice for employers and employees on how to talk about reducing risks in the workplace. <p>Pregnant women</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Pregnant women are considered 'clinically vulnerable' or in some cases 'clinically extremely vulnerable' to coronavirus (COVID-19) and therefore require special consideration as set out in the guidance for pregnant employees. Employers should carry out a risk assessment to follow the Management of Health and Safety at Work Regulations 1999 (MHSW). Pregnant women of any gestation should not be required to continue working if this is not supported by the risk assessment. Women who are 28 weeks pregnant and beyond, or are pregnant and have an underlying health condition that puts them at a greater risk of severe illness from COVID-19 at any gestation, should take a more precautionary approach.
