# Maths

# Learning in school:

During this week in maths the children will be continuing to work on their addition skills by beginning to add together two 2 digit numbers where the ones 'bridge a ten' = for example 25 + 17. We will begin the week by playing the 'exchange game' which is played with dienes and teaches children that they can exchange ten ones for a ten stick when adding numbers that 'bridge a ten'. From working with dienes, children will then move to using jottings and solving word problems. At the end of the week, children will be undertaking a maths investigation which will help to develop their reasoning skills further.

#### English

#### Learning in school:

This week in school, we will begin by looking in detail at the sound mat which accompanies our new phonics scheme, 'Little Wandle, Letters and Sounds Revised'. This will help consolidate the knowledge that, in some cases, there are many different graphemes that can be used to write a sound (phoneme). We will also familiarise the children with the visuals used in the scheme.

Later in the week we will be listening to and discussing the poem The Rhythm of Life/Hand on the Bridge by Michael Rosen. We will talk about rhythm, expression and the positive points about Michael Rosen's performance. Children will then recite the poem themselves in pairs, working on their delivery.

Children will then start to work on their own poem entitled 'Hand to your Ear, What can you Hear?' in the style of Michael Rosen. They will use their real observations from sounds in the playground to write a poem using powerful verbs and interesting adjectives.

#### Reading:

This week we will moving onto a new text in our Bug Club shared reading scheme: Junko Tabei - One Step at a time. This book is about the first woman to climb Mount Everest. The biography describes her refusal to give up, and her determination to take one step at a time to achieve her dreams. It is an inspiring and motivational story about overcoming the odds through perseverance.

The book also has links to Geography, understanding what mountains are and identifying their basic key features.

Key vocabulary to be studied: Weathering Erosion Range (of mountains) Slopes Glaciers

We will be collecting yellow reading records in throughout the week to award stickers to those children who have read to an adult at home every day in the previous week.

# Phonics

# Learning in school:

In Phonics we will be continuing to recap our Phase 5 sounds, focusing this week on 'igh', 'ai', 'oa' and 'u' (as in music, unit etc) alongside the tricky words: two, eye, thought, through, friend.

Topic

Learning in school:

Inside PE: Children will be continuing to develop their teambuilding skills by working as a group to solve problems. Children will work on using positive language when communicating with their teammates.

Outside PE: This week the children will be developing their fitness, stamina and agility by participating in circuits.

Music: Along with playing musical games, each week the children 'listen and appraise' different pieces of music. This week it's 'You Can Call Me Al' by Paul Simon. Children will explain why they like or dislike the song and talk about which instruments they can hear. We will then continue to learn the song 'Hands, Feet, Heart' and add a more difficult glockenspiel part to our performance.

PSHE: This week, we will be introducing and discussing the PANTS rules by showing the class the Pantosaurus pants song (NSPCC). https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=LnroTxz7USI

RE: Children will be continuing to learn about Christianity by listening to and discussing the story of Jonah and the Whale.

*Geography*: This week, children will be completing some map work across two lessons. They will be helping the Queen get from Buckingham Palace to the Tower of London using grid references, compass points and directional language.

Science: Children will be continuing to learn about different materials and their properties. Children will complete an investigation into which material would be best to stop a leak in a London Eye capsule.

Computing: This week we will be continuing our coding topic, looking at algorithms. We will be learning how to use the 'timer-after' command.


As it has been 'Feel Good Week' this week, we would like children to play Wellbeing Bingo over the weekend. ©

# Advance Warning:

Our RSE (Relationships and Sex Education) Policy states the need for common language to name parts of the human body. In order that the children are able to talk about their bodies in a way that enables them to explain injuries, or safeguard themselves from harm.

In the week commencing 18<sup>th</sup> October 2021, we will be introducing the correct anatomical names for all parts of our body. This includes the correct male and female genitalia terms.

The following terms will be taught to the children through the means of a very child friendly, age-appropriate lesson. We will be using anatomically correct dolls which will be dressed identically, and we will discuss how parents know whether their new baby is a boy or a girl.

KS1 Agreed terminology:

for external genitalia to be taught at The Mead Infant and Nursery School:

Female external genitalia -

Vulva - the area between a girl's legs, which includes the openings to the vagina and urethra

Vagina - the small opening between a girl's legs - a small tube from the outside to the inside of the body

Urethra - the tiny opening near the vagina of a tiny tube through which "wee" leaves the body

Male external genitalia -

Penis – the spongy tissue that dangles between a boy's legs. Boys urinate "wee" through a tube in their penis (the urethra)

Testicles - two plum shaped "balls" in a squashy bag (the scrotum) behind the penis.

This forms The Mead Infant School's part of the Sex Education element of RSE. Parents do have a statutory right to withdraw their child from this element but we would strongly suggest that you allow your child to access this learning, as a matter of safeguarding for your own child. If you do decide to withdraw your child from this lesson, then it is important, however, that you discuss these terms with your child at home. The children will, undoubtedly, use this language, both at home with you, and at school, and it is often best taught in the proper context than being overheard in the playground.
