Learning in school:

Theme for the Term: Dangerous Dinosaurs!

We are going back in time to widen our knowledge about dinosaurs. We will be looking at the similarities and differences between the dinosaurs, their size and features. We will also be learning facts using non-fiction books and learning how to look after dinosaurs.

Theme for the Week: That's not my Dinosaur

At the beginning of the week, the children will come in to find a surprise. Our eggs hatched and each class now has a pet dinosaur! We will be looking at the book That's not my Dinosaur. We will have a focus on materials and identifying the materials used on the different pages to create different effects. Children will be making their own dinosaurs from junk modelling. We will be introducing a cutting station with a variety of materials and scissors to practise our cutting skills.

We will need lots of junk modelling including boxes, tubes, egg boxes etc as well as packaging e.g. bubble wrap and packing peanuts. Please could you send in anything you have for us to use. Also the type of packing shown below if you have any!



We will also be learning about how to be safe around medicines and looking at packaging from different types of common medicines and vitamins. All packaging will be empty.

Phonics:

This week we will be recapping the digraphs and trigraphs we have learned previously (qu, ch, sh, th, ng, nk, ai, ee, igh, oa) and learning the new digraphs oo(look), oo(moon), ar and or. Our tricky words will be and, push, was, you, they.

Maths:

This week, we will be working on 1 more and 1 less. We will be looking at composition of 5 and the parts that make the whole e.g. 2 and 3 make 5. We will also be recapping subitising (recognising small numbers of objects without the need to count).

Additional notes and reminders

Homework

Sound sheets will still be given out each week.

We will also be starting our maths homework. Maths homework can be found in the blue homework folders in your child's bookbag. Please pick a game to play and write notes on how your child is getting on. The aim of the homework is to help the children learn to subitise (recognise without counting) dotty amounts and to begin to learn some simple addition facts off by heart. If you do not have a dice at home then please email your class teacher and they will print off a paper dice for you to have for home.

Homework folders will be collected in the same day that sounds folders are collected in.

PSHE

During the week commencing 20th January, we will be covering our Relationship and Sex Education aspect of the PSHE subject. We will be introducing the correct anatomical names for male and female genitalia. The following terms will be taught to the children through the means of a very child friendly, age-appropriate lesson about finding out whether a new baby in the family is a boy or a girl. We will be using anatomically correct dolls again which will be dressed identically, and we will discuss how parents know whether their new baby is a boy or a girl.

The following terms will be taught to Nursery and Reception children: Female external genitalia -

Vulva – the area between a girl's legs at the front. Bottom- rear bottom which has two cheeks that are soft so we can sit comfortably.

Male external genitalia -

Penis - the spongy tissue that dangles between a boy's legs. Testicles - two little balls in a squashy bag behind the penis. Bottom- rear bottom which has two cheeks that are soft so we can sit comfortably. This forms The Mead Infant and Nursery School's part of the Sex Education element of RSE. Parents do have a statutory right to withdraw their child from this element but we would strongly suggest that you allow your child to access this learning, as a matter of safeguarding for your own child.

If you do decide to withdraw your child from this lesson, then it is important, however, that you discuss these terms with your child at home. The children will, undoubtedly, use this language, both at home with you, and at school, and it is often best taught in the proper context than being overheard in the playground.
